ISSUES & IMPACT



The Sean P. McIllmail Institute of SOL Reform made significant strides in 2023, demonstrating our relentless advocacy and strategic legislative efforts. The Legal team submitted testimony 45 times, contributing to enacting new SOL reform laws in 15 states, often providing repeated testimonies as bills advanced through various committees. In 2023, 38 states and the federal government introduced SOL reform bills, with 20 aimed at eliminating the criminal SOL, 18 to extend the criminal SOL, 26 to eliminate the civil SOL, 16 to extend the civil SOL, and 21 window/revival laws. Among the major successes, 15 states saw the implementation of new SOL reform laws, including 2 that eliminated the criminal SOL, 6 that extended the criminal SOL, 5 that eliminated the civil SOL, 5 that extended the civil SOL, and 4 that introduced civil window/revival provisions. The Institute's dedicated efforts have significantly advanced the protection of children's rights through comprehensive statute of limitation reforms.

ISSUES & IMPACT



Federal Legislation



CHILD USA has been making considerable strides in advancing the civil rights of children through advocating for federal legislation since 2016. In 2022, CHILD USA, together with its sister organization, CHILD USAdvocacy, worked with federal lawmakers to draft and enact laws that will better protect children throughout the country.

Eliminating Limits to Justice for Child Sex Abuse Victims Act of 2022



CHILD USA played an integral role in the successful passage of Federal legislation that eliminates the civil statute of limitation for over a dozen federal child sex abuse-related offenses, including sex trafficking of children, sexual abuse of a minor, and sexual exploitation of children. Now victims of these heinous crimes will be able to come forward when they are ready.

Bankruptcy Law Reform



CHILD USA led the way in 2022 with a groundbreaking proposal to make federal Bankruptcy law safer and more effective for child victims. The Norton Journal for Bankruptcy Law and Practice published our social science and legal insights into the problem in two articles. Overall, the reforms CHILD USA is advocating for in the bankruptcy system would provide victims with a voice and more influence in holding the institutions that allowed their abuse accountable.

ISSUES & IMPACT

Title IX





CHILD USA's Legal Department engages in meticulous research and analysis through which they were able to identify the shortcomings in the existing Title IX framework and the urgent need for legislative change. In 2022, the Legal Department served as a resource and partner for federal lawmakers in the fight to amend Title IX to ensure equal access to justice for all victims of sexual assault, regardless of geographic borders. Additionally, in 2022, the legal team provided amicus support on two groundbreaking Title IX cases against Ohio State University for their role in covering-up decades of abuse by denounced university physician Richard Strauss. Our expertise and research enabled us to educate the courts about the functional and systemic obstacles that victims face when seeking to hold their schools accountable for enabling abuse.

Online Exploitation & Abuse

BANKRUPTCY REFORM

In 2023, CHILD USA focused on addressing the exploitation of the federal bankruptcy system by organizations accused of child sex abuse, such as the Catholic Church, USA Gymnastics, and the Boy Scouts of America. Despite progress in SOL reform enabling victims to seek justice, many organizations have evaded accountability by filing for Chapter 11 bankruptcy, thereby minimizing victim payouts and preventing further litigation under window legislation. This misuse not only undermines the SOL reforms but also perpetuates trauma for survivors. CHILD USA convened roundtables with bankruptcy experts to identify shortcomings and proposed four critical reforms to the Federal Bankruptcy Code to ensure victims' fairness and dignity. These efforts underscore CHILD USA's commitment to protecting children's rights and advocating for systemic reforms that uphold accountability and justice.


ONLINE EXPLOITATION AND ABUSE


CHILD USA played a crucial role in shaping the STOP CSAM Act, a landmark bill aimed at safeguarding children from sexual exploitation and abuse. While supportive of its core objectives, CHILD USA recognized severe flaws in an earlier version of the bill that could have had detrimental unintended consequences, particularly for victims of abuse and survivors of child sexual exploitation. Through their advocacy and expertise, CHILD USA worked diligently to ensure that the STOP CSAM Act's final version prioritized the protection of children and the rights of victims. The decision to withdraw support from an unfavorable iteration of the bill during a critical hearing, where figures like Zuckerberg were expected to testify, was instrumental in prompting revisions that addressed these concerns. Ultimately, CHILD USA's advocacy helped shape legislation that strengthens protections for child victims and supports a more equitable and effective framework for combating child sexual abuse online and offline.
